

For I will keep you with me to guide me when it's time.


Your lives are all a celebration to all that new you well,

# THE PENTAGON MEMORIAL

## WE WILL NEVER FORGET

On September 11, 2001, terrorists used American Airlines Flight 77 to attack the Pentagon, claiming 184 lives that day. Among those who were lost were men, women, children, mothers and fathers, husbands and wives, sisters and brothers, and daughters and sons. The youngest lost was only 3 years old, and the oldest was 71. They came from all walks of life—administrative assistants, doctors, educators, flight crew members, military leaders, scientists, and students. They came from cities large and small, across the United States, and from all over the world. Despite the differences that distinguished them, these innocent individuals are united through the events that unfolded on one of the darkest days in America's history. Most importantly, those who were lost were our family members, colleagues, and dearest friends.

The Pentagon Memorial contains 184 units, each of which is dedicated to one of the victims by its unique placement within the collective field. The field is organized as a timeline of the victims' ages, moving from the youngest, 3-year-old Dana Falkenberg, to the oldest, John D. Yamnicky, 71.


Each memorial unit was positioned to identify those on board American Airlines Flight 77 from those within the Pentagon. The memorial units representing the 59 lives lost on Flight 77 are positioned so that a visitor will face the sky when reading the name of the victim the unit is dedicated to. For those memorial units dedicated to a victim who was inside the Pentagon, the visitor will see the victim's name and the Pentagon in the same view. Each simple but elegant memorial unit is dedicated with the person's name, a glowing light pool, and a cantilevered bench, and offers a place for permanent reflection of each life remembered.
